CP is an Amazing Gift

Halldor Bjarnason is a remarkable man. When he was inducted into the Manitoba Hall of Sports Fame in November last year, his accomplishment confirmed my opinion.

Halldor holds the world record for the 1500 and 3000 metre races, first clocked at the Paralympic Games, Seoul, Korea in 1988. Dressed in a natty dark brown suit, complete with hanky, when I met him in Winnipeg recently, he seemed unimpressed by his award, coming "thirty years late" in his words.

Halldor was born in Winnipeg on Hallowe'en 59 years ago to Ken and Mildred Bjarnason. Many of us remember Mildred whom Halldor described as "small and scarey but diplomatic too". I knew her as the top fundraiser on my CPMB Bike Race team when I was captain. Her efforts always awed me but, as I've learned, you would never say "no" to Mildred. Halldor is no different.

As his athletic therapist and close friend, Professor Glen Bergeron told me, "Halldor exudes positivity; he is open to all kinds of challenges. He simply doesn't accept no as an answer."

When Halldor was in grade ten, Bergeron met him attending a Sports Injury Course Glen was running at the University. After completing the course, Halldor returned to his high school, recruited students and invited Bergeron to conduct a training workshop. Thereafter, the students under Halldor's direction, attended all games and provided medical aid to anyone in the games who got injured.

At the time, Halldor was getting around Winnipeg on a standard trike which he had to replace yearly. When he decided to get a better trike, he found a bike maker in Cobourg, Ontario. The 14-speed trike with 20 mm tires was built to Halldor's precise measurements.

His racing career came about by accident, he explained, when he set up a CP Sports organization and attended the Disability Games in Edmonton. "Dad was told by a coach, I could be good if I stopped screwing around," he admitted. "I haven't stopped pushing since, just kept on going."

From the University of Winnipeg, Halldor moved to Queens University in Kingston, where he pursued his legal studies, even as he cycled 20-30 km every morning in the gym. "You get into a routine: sprint race for two minutes hard; two minutes slowdown, then off again, expending a 100[%] burst of energy.

"For me, attending competitions gave me a great opportunity to travel. I travelled all over the world to compete. It was a great adventure for me. As part of the Canadian team, it was amazing to experience such camaraderie. At that level, you get to meet people very dedicated to what they do. They can do anything."

Glen Bergeron confirms that describes Halldor's personality too. "His physical challenges take a back seat to his desire to experience everything in life. To me personally and to my entire family, he is an inspiration. He's always striving."

The President of Queens University shared Bergeron's sentiments. When Halldor received his law degree and brought his medals home, the University president held a gala dinner in his honour.

Halldor is quick to say, "You can't do anything like this all by yourself. You need a group of people. I learned that people like to be asked to help but you have to ask."

He credits Larry Didow, who was committed to getting people with disabilities into the University of Winnipeg. His parents who pushed and supported him were top of his list and now—the best of all supports—his son who is his biggest joy in life, a gift that has given him his true purpose. (8)

Free To Be Me: Accessibility Hacks To Personalize Your Life

Over the last seven years I have scoured the inter-webs trying to find products which would make life easier, for me and others, while also not breaking the bank in the process.

Spill Not (\$30)

A hidden gem, a lot of people see it as a party gag, but I use mine daily, and if God forbid someone moves it, all hell will break loose.



The concept is simple: it holds your cup while you walk or roll and there is a long handle you hold it from. The only real instruction is to put the cup as centred as possible on the Spill Not. Low and behold it doesn't spill ever! I don't know the magic behind this, all I can figure out is that there must be



some kind of weight in the bottom of it but who cares how it works—it holds very large mugs which is all I care about.

True test: I brought it to my mom's place and asked her to give me a glass of water, then I swung it at her, she screamed and then looked at me and said, "Give me that! How did that work?" Prior to this whenever I would drink my coffee I would have a spill line going from the kitchen to wherever I was going. Not anymore. If that wasn't enough, you can hold it with just one finger.

Billy shoes (Prices can vary)

Last but definitely not least, Billy shoes are completely accessible shoes for all ages. Which have zippers built-in so no laces need to be undone; but they also have laces so they look like a normal shoe. There are so many styles and colours to choose from. I have a few pairs myself.

Pro Tip: We are all big kids at heart, and if you see a big kid shoe that you want, just find the appropriate size. These can be somewhat

expensive, but if your foot is not growing anymore why not treat yourself. If your foot is growing these will last a while.

Also, the shoes can be covered by insurance with a doctor's note. Doctors love 'em. The amount of



people I have surprised, doctors among them, when they ask if I need help with my shoe and I just unzip them, is amazing.

The website has a very comprehensive and easy sizing guide which is very accurate. This was the first pair of shoes I ordered online and they fit very nicely, if I do say so myself. Pictured above and below are the two pairs I have. They have boots as well and they are made for use with



AFOs and other braces.

The first few times I put the shoes on, and even now I will go to take them off and forget which side the zipper is on or go to undo the laces. I can now shop for fashion knowing
