Over the years Jeff regaled me in stories of hunting, leading individuals on their adventures of a lifetime, and enjoying people. I saw the kindness of him and Susan offering their home so that the members who use wheelchairs could be included in the Bike Race Volunteer wind up party.

Even though he was one of the last captains to "go online", Jeff was a super-organized Bike Race Captain. He always had the donations organized, receipt books returned and all the paperwork done. Jeff was the mainstay of the 'CP Peddlers' at the start of the Winnipeg Bike Race. The Peddlers had a unique nickname—the 'Mad Hatters', (you can guess why)! Later on, Jeff and Susan organized both the 'Bruce Family and Friends Team' and kept the 'UFFW – Firefighters' team on board of all these years.

Her growing-up years were spent in The Pas on Ross Avenue with her twin mate Arne and older brother Wayne. She loved music and spending time with her friends, going for walks in her wheelchair, and enjoying the outdoors.

Alice aspired to having her own apartment and being on her own so off she went to Winnipeg to 1010 Sinclair, an independent living home. With the help from friends, family and caregivers, Alice was able to accomplish this enormous feat.

When Pineview opened in The Pas, an independent living apartment block, she moved back and lived there setting up her own place with the help of home care. In 2005, Alice moved again to Brandon and got her own place in the Kiwanis block and began self-care management, hiring and scheduling her own workers with help from her friend and priest Fr. Emil.

Surrounded by her Precious Moments collection and many other things she had collected over the years, photos, angels, Alice began her life in Brandon.

She became a member of the Catholic Church and began a beautiful friendship with Father Emil which lasted until his death in 2020.

Alice moved into Hillcrest Place Personal Care Home in Brandon where she resided until she passed on December 26, 2023.

She is survived by her brothers Arne (Bunni), Wayne (Margot); nieces and nephews Leanne, Wendy, Kirk, and Kari; and grand nieces and nephews Eric, Kayla, Danielle, and Curtis.

David went to school at the University of Winnipeg and graduated with a political science degree, and then worked for the City of Winnipeg's Handl-Transit service for nine years. In Loving Memory of our Friend **Rita Paynter** (née Denedchezhe) • (1972 – 2024)

Rita was a presence. It has been said it takes a village to raise a child. Rita was a survivor of the Sixties Scoop, so Rita made a village for herself. Many of us knew Rita for the years she volunteered for CPMB in the office; she added her voice to a Freedom Concepts video and to our new Cohabit Video; she stayed all day at the Stationary Bike Race. She would never sign up as a volunteer like everybody else. Rita showed up and worked on her terms: selling water bottles, directing people at the Wellness Centre or simply hanging out and being there. As a personality, she was interested in everybody and everything. She always had plenty to tell you and she wanted to know everything you were willing to share. For Rita, people mattered. She was sad if you shared unhappy news; she celebrated when you were happy. And then she motored on.

I remember Rita as a much younger person when she showed up at school or at the house and stayed the weekend. Since she had first come down south from her Dene community, of which she became increasingly proud, she had a fierce determination to live her life to the full. And she did. Living as a foster child and moving more than once, struggling and getting through school, she told harrowing tales about what she'd experienced but never felt sorry for herself. Wearing AFOsmagic boots, as I call them—on her slender brown legs, she walked with difficulty and happily graduated to a power chair. Seeing her with her plaid flannel pyjama pants, her feet clad in moccasins, she tootled all over Osborne Village, downtown in the cold and wherever she wanted to go. Rita was always on the move.

Her power chair gave her the freedom she needed and if it broke down, she

immediately demanded a fix or she'd talk to the media. They loved her. She was vocal. Whether she was living in a downtown apartment or somewhere else, she turned up as a role model for all of us who worried about our children's future. If Rita could do it-and she showed us that she did-then they could do it too. Spirit was essential. At the CPMB retreats, she would curl up in a hug with Gemma and listen as I read aloud from Winnie the Pooh, from Animal Ark and all the other glorious children's literature for what seemed like hours. She loved it; she listened and later asked all sorts of questions, like why did you stop? She was curious and engaged.

She loved the Folk Festival. She camped out there one year. I cannot imagine how she managed. But Rita did. She found people to help when she needed it. She was never shy to ask. Sometimes, she phoned David a dozen times a day. He was her go-to person; why wasn't he always available?

Before the Bike Race, she turned up at the office with dozens of crumpled bills and half-written receipts: her donations. Math wasn't her strong suit but that didn't deter her in her collections. Who could say "no" to Rita and make it stick? She'd smile and keep on going. She played boccia; she swam; she balked at little and lived life to the full.

Once she met and loved Ray, she would move heaven and earth to help him, advocating and pushing for his care. Others' needs always seemed to be ahead of her own. Still, she managed to get what she needed. Her pride and resilience was evident in her huge smile. We, who knew her, respected and admired her. *Miigwech, Rita. Rest in peace.*
